We held the official media day for "The Next Gen" on May 10th, 2023, the first ever mag photoshoot we got to run at the UNDRGRND Production Studios in Downtown Los Angeles. The black and gold striped wall you see in the background of our main cover is part of the new studio's 'Casino Set.' 



### **HOMETOWN LOVE:**

BIGBE!: "There's been a lot of support for our music from East Hollywond, and our specific area of Melrose Hill. We're all helping each other out here—some people be helping out with the merch, for example. I love seeing them fouls do their own thing. We help each other."

BORNVET: "Metrose Hill is the name of the neighborhond we grew up while in East Hollywond. Everybody knows each other. There are people who knew us when we were kids, who now know our kids."



"CARISMAAAAA!"

If you're from Los Angeles, you know that's the tag of the beloved DJ Carisma. Producer, 3x DJ of the Year recipient, and arguably the queen of West Coast radio. For most of this century, Southern California has watched Carisma pour her heart and soul into championing spaces in radio for hip-hop

artists. Today, she continues to thrive as a DJ in the true essence of the profession: a mix-maker, record-breaker, crowd-curator, artist-advocate, and an overall voice for real rap culture.

"I love seeing someone's life change," Carisma says. "Being able to help an artist really break, that's what I'm most passionate about. Seeing them take off is


the best thing ever."

Becoming an established Latina DJ in one of urban radio's top markets was pretty unprecedented at the time of Carisma's come up. She grew up in the '90s outside of Los Angeles, as she is an Orange County native, born and raised in nearby Santa Ana. California.

Not too many people make it big [from Orange County]," Carisma says. "I'm proud of it. Everyone's a Dodgers fan, I'm reppin' Angels. Orange County

should've bought the Clippers...it

would've been lit."

She jumped to mixing on air in 2008, eventually breaking New Boyz' viral 2009 single, "You're a Jerk."
Carisma pushed the record early in the LA market, helping the song reach No. 24 on the US Billboard Hot 100. The track was such a hit, it is considered to be the lone song that kicked off the infamous Jerkin' Era, and landed New Boyz a label deal.

"I'm good at picking talent," Carisma says.
"I've helped many people get on. I can spot a

star and I know I'm good at that."

Since "You're a Jerk," Carisma has broken more records and introduced SoCal talent to the mainstream scene, including YG, Ty Dolla \$ign, Tyga, Problem, Nipsey Hussle, DJ Mustard and TeeFLii. More recently, she's helped artists like Sexyy Red, lamsu!, Sage the Gemini, G-Eazy, and Rayven Justice share new drops with radio listeners and club goers in LA. Carisma also releases her own catalog of music—her most notable song is "Party Party Party" featuring Dej Loaf & Chris Brown.

Teaming up with DJ Wavy, Carisma founded Young California Radio, a platform aimed at sewing the gap between the LA and The Bay area's hip-hop scenes. It was through Young California that Carisma first met Cypress Moreno, a young DJ who would go on to work with Shoreline Mafia, Kalan.FrFr, AzChike,

Rucci, and more LA rap icons.

VER FM "That's my little brother right there," Carisma says of Cypress. "He's a younger me. He did during his generation, what I did during mine. He's had his finger on the pulse."

During the 2023 NFL Offseason, Carisma announced her biggest gig yet. She will be spending Sundays inside So-Fi Stadium as the official new DJ for the Los Angeles Rams.

But as she keeps adding impressive titles to her resume, Carisma keeps elevating her goals. She tells UNDRGRND Magazine that she wants to produce a cartoon series on YouTube, in addition to the comic book she already has out. In terms of the radio world, Carisma says an executive role of sorts is in her future plans.

"I'm trying to land me a boss position next," Carisma says. "Definitely. I want to get a boss seat."







### "FRENCH TOAST" FREESTYLE



BOTH COASTS: "I'm born and raised in West Los Angeles, but I have a lot of East Coast and Midwest influence. You got a lot of artists who have taken awhile to break but if you have substance, delivery, and good music you'll be respected for it."

delivery, and good music you'll be respected for it."

CERTIFIED MOVIE BUFF: "I want to get into acting first before filmmaking. I have written some screenplays and want to make dark comedies, satire, crime dramas, and thrillers. Films that will stand the test of time. I have favorite directors—Spike Lee, [Quentin] Tarantino, Guy Richie, Danny Boyle, David Fincher, John Singleton. Maybe one day I'll get a Grammy or Oscar, why not?"

GORILLAZ, RHCP, DMX: "I've always had a wide taste of music. I was listening to different kinds of genres and production styles. I was that dude with an MP3 player that'd play everything. It could be the Gorillaz, then the Red Hot Chili Peppers, and then DMX. Keeping that in my pocket made me never want to focus on one particular sound."

BATTLING MODERN MUSIC CONSUMPTION: "We're in this generation that gets bored with music pretty quickly. It's almost like 'music-ADHD.' I want my music to be a different experience each time, like Kanye West or The Weeknd. In every album or project, they're progressing instead of staying stagnant. I want people to be surprised by what direction I'm

taking or what music I'm sampling at that time."

FUTURE PROJECT: "I'm finally dropping an in-depth project real soon, about 15 to 16 songs. I already have a working title and some ideas. Throughout my music journey, I've felt overlooked. I take from that Drake song, 'Worst Behavior.' I've always felt like the underdog, which is the theme going forward."

NO SINGLE LA SOUND: "There are some dope artists who are coming out that have been making noise. I definitely want to push the flag for West LA and Mid-City and show different parts of LA. Everyone expects you to be a gangster or a Hollywood type. West LA is one of the most diverse

areas and contains different sub-cultures and I want to be a part of representing that in my music."

FIVE YEARS FROM NOW: "I see myself doing a whole world tour and expanding on my music.

Once artists get fame and success, some want to chill and party. I see myself actually dropping more music once the engine is running and staying consistent. I also see myself with a label or trying to put on different kinds of artists from the

West Coast."



"I've always felt like a chameleon. I want to be a spontaneous hip-hop artist who you can't figure out."

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# PUERTO RICO:

"So I was born in Carolina, Puerto Rico, and raised outside of San Juan in a place called Trujillo Alto, Puerto Rico. I lived in Georgia and ended up actually hitching from the East Coast all the way out here to the West Coast. Right now I'm based in Grover Beach. I've been living out here for about eight years in 'The 805."

"Being in a military family, you're kind of secluded. You're not really used to going out with people, I don't know. You kind of just get to know people fast and just keep to your P's and Q's and keep on walking, 'cause you just never know who you're gonna see next and you're not gonna see them for too long, either."

# AMERICAN IDOL:

"It was American Idol pre-auditions, not the actual American Idol audition on TV, but like the ones before where they kind of sift everybody out and then they picked the people for the show. So they had that in Georgia at the Savannah Civic Center, and I decided to go. I ended up actually beatboxing on an American Idol audition, just because I just thought it would be a fun thing to do. I had a harmonica while I was doing it."

"I wasn't really too serious about music until I went to school for audio production over at Full Sail University. So I have an audio production bachelor's degree. But I got into production about a year before I started school. And I got myself on a MPC and I was making myself beats out of that. But school was an accelerated program, and they kind of taught me how to engineer."

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE & MUSIC:
"It's of timely importance to know how to use AI for your music because it will keep you independent. It's gonna lower your costs. Second, you're not gonna need to hire as many people as before. A lot of people get scared because when they think of AI, they think of like Terminator, if you get what I mean. I, Robot, things like that. If you don't use it now, you're definitely gonna be outta the loop of how music's gonna be made."

# SPIRITUALITY IN LYRICS:

"I wouldn't consider myself a Christian rapper, but I do talk about my spiritual beliefs and how it applies in my life. But some of [my music is] just hard rap that just talks about things like starting from ground zero and building myself up, basically."

# CHIDDY BANG. EMINEM. LILO KEY:

"I've been listening to Chiddy Bang's music and really studying it for a good minute. Another influence of course, is Eminem. Actually, my first record ever bought was *Curtain Call: The Hits* by Eminem. The first ever rap I was exposed to. An upcoming artist who's an influence on me is Lilo Key, I've been listening to him since like 2016, and seen his growth as an artist from close to the beginning of his music career.

























"I was born and raised there, but I'm currently in Riverside right now. Music's been a part of my life, my whole life. I wrote my first song when I was like, I dunno, like four or five or something. I gave it to my mama—sh still has that shit too. It's like, uh, hella bad, you know what I'm saying? But music's always kind of been my thing, I guess. She's the one that encouraged me to do it"

"XXXTentacion—that fool was hella versatile. I don't know, that just kind of inspired me to want to do everything. As I started doing more music, I started to realize that just rapping wasn't my thing. I started doing Lo-fi music for a minute, and I started experimenting with house music and into RnB shit recently."

# OPENING FOR AZCHIKE SUMMER 2022:

Magazine shows. I don't remember which magazine exactly it was, but I opened up for AzChike at Los Globos in LA. I've "I've done a few shows. 

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## **GOD FIRST**

"Always gotta pray to God, first, when I wake up. I was born into a religious family and I just started praying again. Recently, my grandma passed away, so I just got back on the same path. I want to be having a strong mindset, still believing that there's something out there for us."

# NO LANGUAGE BARRIERS:

"My parents wanted [my siblings and me] to stay true to ourselves and not lose our past. My family came all the way from India, so for us it's like they didn't want us to get whitewashed. I learned Arabic from my grandma's side, and I speak Hindi from both parents' sides. I also speak Punjabi."

## STUDENT RAPPER THINGS

"I had a show and was performing near Sunset [Blvd.], and I think it was an open bar or something like that. It was a really small stage, but I saw two of my teachers come through [Laughs]. My friends couldn't even come at that time."

## BE INDEPENDENT

"A lot of artists make excuses, like, 'Oh, my producer's not coming in today so I won't be able to record.' Like, nah bro, stop depending. Be

independent. Anyone can do anything these days!"



"The first song that I made was called 'IDGAF'—I don't give a fuck. That song hit 10k (streams). That was in high school, so I wasn't expecting that type of reaction."

# GROWING WITH MANAGER DONALD "DON" REYES:

"I've never had a manager before, so for me as an artist it was a very big step. He, too, felt the same way and we both gave it a try. It just clicked, we both built chemistry like that. I learned a lot from him. Just him encouraging me, helping me perfect my craft and find my sound. I wouldn't even be comfortable doing interviews, doing a cover art photoshoot, being on a stage, without him. I always tell people, you see me, you're gonna see Don. But you gotta treat this shit like a relationship. Be accountable for your actions. Be communicative, be responsible, be open."

# OVERNIGHT SUCCESS (UPCOMING ALBUM):

The title is supposed to be ironic, like a reality check. Nothing happens overnight, people can't blow up overnight. This shit, has come a long way, but this happened over so many nights."
